GLEN ALPIN CONSERVANCY

Glen Alpin is on the Township Committee's agenda as they consider options presented by consultants Spinelli and Pinto. As choices are weighed, the Glen Alpin Conservancy wants you to know that:

- •Glen Alpin is the finest Gothic Revival house in New Jersey. So stated Janet Foster, chair of the New Jersey Historic Trust (a state agency). We concur.
- •The open space in front contains the graves of Peter Kemble and his family. Kemble was appointed to the Provincial Council, the upper house of the legislature that governed the colony of New Jersey, in 1745 under King George II. He became its president in 1764 under George III and remained so until 1775 when the council last met. The Kemble family was significant during the American Revolution and to the history of the Morristown National Historical Park. Peter Kemble, through his daughter Margaret who married General Thomas Gage, is an ancestor of the Viscounts of Firle in East Sussex, England (see<u>firle.com</u>)
- •The corner at the intersection of Tempe Wick Road and Mount Kemble Avenue is one of the most archaeologically sensitive areas on the property and was the site of a confrontation between mutineers and forces of General Anthony Wayne, who was occupying the Kemble house at the time. (The Kemble house was moved north of the current Glen Alpin site in 1847 when the stone Gothic Revival house was built.)
- •Glen Alpin is an important contributing building and site in the Tempe Wick Road-Washington Corners Historic District on the state and National Register of Historic Places. The open corner at Glen Alpin is a gateway to this district.
- •The land at Glen Alpin drains toward the Primrose Brook—still the cleanest brook in the Great Swamp watershed.

HARDING TOWNSHIP POLICE

Chief of Police, Mark Giansanti announces the opportunity for citizens to clear out the medicine cabinets and dispose of unwanted/unused drugs and medicines.

"Operation Take Back New Jersey" is a DEA sponsored event in which the Harding Township Police Department will be taking part. Any citizen can drop off their unwanted/unused medications in a container at police headquarters; No questions asked, No forms to fill, just simply place the drugs/medications in the container. The day of this event is - **Saturday, April 29**th, **2017, 10am-2pm**.

- 1) This program is anonymous and all efforts should be made to protect the anonymity of individuals disposing of medications. No questions or requests for identification will be made. Individuals should deposit medication freely and independently.
- 2) No effort will be made by law enforcement to count, inventory, or log medications. Law enforcement personnel will not handle the medications at any time.
- 3) A law enforcement officer must remain with the drug disposal box at all times. The role of the law enforcement officer is to maintain and safe-guard the integrity of the disposed items.
- 4) Any individual may dispose of medication either in its original container or by removing medication from its container and depositing directly into the Drug Disposal Box. If the original container is submitted, the individual is encouraged to remove the prescription label if it contains any personal identifying information.
- 5) Liquid products, such as cough medicine, should remain sealed in their original container. The depositor should ensure that the cap is tightly sealed to prevent leakage.
- 6) Syringes or other sharp objects will not be accepted.
- 7) Once the event is completed, Harding officers will turn over all collected drugs/medications to the DEA for proper disposal.

"Bringing Up Birdie"

HARDING HUMANE SOLUTIONS

What was that "thud" you just heard at the window? Or, what happened to that small song bird you found dead under a window? Birds do not perceive glass as a barrier! They fail to realize that the window is there and fly smack into it with fatal results. Collisions with glass surfaces kill billions of, (yes that's billions with a "B"), birds every year. There are things you can do to help. Keep your blinds (whether open or closed) **down** if you can. This helps the birds understand that the windows are there and that they cannot fly through them. This is important 24/7 but especially at dusk and dawn when birds are most active and in the dark

when indoor lights attract them. Mount bird feeders right up against a window or no closer to a window than 30 feet. If you hear a "thud" investigate promptly. The bird may be dead, temporarily stunned or badly injured. A stunned immobile bird is vulnerable to predators and to the elements. Transfer the bird to a small box for its protection to see if it will revive as you seek help. Keeping a small box (with lid, lined with a rag) and a hand towel at the ready makes it easy to scoop up and transport any injured bird for medical attention at<u>www.theraptortrust.org</u>. Two excellent articles follow offering "homemade" or "available for sale" solutions to make window collisions less likely. If you own or operate a business, commercial applications are available. Or they can be as simple as hanging a large poster or sign on what would otherwise be a large imperceptible glass surface. Indoor spaces lighted at night behind large glass surfaces are particularly deadly. Finding dead birds can become so routine that building maintenance crews just pick up the dead bodies early each morning, before anyone else is even aware that they were there. April 2017 News & Events Barn Safety Fire Clinic:

On February 11th, under the sponsorship of the HT/GV BPA, Margie Margentino, Manager of Lord Stirling Stables gave an informative presentation on safe practices and preparations in the prevention of barn fires as well as what to do in case of fire. The topics covered included: basic fire behavior, the reasons barns burn well, the causes of such fires, how to prevent fire in your barn, access for the fire department and emergency plans, the use of fire extinguishers and detection devices, fire drills and insurance.

HARDING TOWNSHIP COMMITTEE

Meeting Highlights: February 22, 2017 All members were present.

Township Operating Budget. The 2017 Township operating budget was presented by CFO Himanshu Shah. The very informative slide presentation is on the Township website (www.hardingnj.org).

The CFO reported that in 2016 the Township Committee was responsible for about 25% of the total local taxation of Harding residents. Harding open space tax accounted for an additional about 3% of the taxes. Morris County accounted for 25% and Morris County open space amounted to another 1%. The local Harding school district accounted for 46% of total local taxation.

For 2017, the Harding budget has expenses of \$8.742M, of which \$5.578M (64%) will be raised by taxes. Comparable amounts for 2016 were \$8.737M and \$5.482M (63%). Harding Township receives no state aid. Department cost items equal \$5.606M of the total expense budget. 49% and 20% of the Department costs are for the Police Department and for the Department of Public Works, respectively.

The Township Committee has worked very hard to hold the costs down for health expenses, while still providing good services for employees. For 2017, health expenses will actually decrease by about 1%. The budget also includes a 2% cost of living increase for employees.

Harding will "save" \$381K in bond principal and interest this year, from the retirement in 2016 of a bond. Harding has outstanding debt of \$5.9M (debt service will be \$619K in 2017) and retains its enviable AAA bond rating. Current debt will be paid by 2028. However, the Township Committee warned that possible debt for future affordable housing could be looming on the horizon.

The net valuation of Harding (decreases in valuation from successful tax appeals and increases from new construction) is \$2,006,548,979 a decrease of 0.03% from 2016 (2,007,139,768).

Harding tax rate for 2017 will be 0.278/\$100 valuation, an increase of 1.8% from 2016. The Township Committee has not decided on the Open Space tax for 2017. It is currently 4 cents/\$100 valuation (same as in 2015 and 2016; increased from 3.5 cents in 2014).

Township Capital Budget: After considerable public discussion, the Township Committee proposed a capital budget of \$700K for 2017, an increase of \$200K from 2016. The increase in capital budget is largely funded by a portion of the savings in bond principal and interest. The capital budget maintains Harding's ability to pay-as-you-go on major expenses with lifetimes of five years and more. Administrator Gail McKane maintains a ten-year rolling capital plan for Harding, ensuring that pay-as-you-go is held to.

The operating and capital budgets will be adopted at a public hearing on March 20.

Other business: Class II Special Law Enforcement Officer Alexandru Nastase was sworn in for service in Harding. He is a 2016 graduate of the Cape May Police Academy.

The Township Committee voted unanimously to award a contract to Verizon Communications for a cell tower at the DPW site. Details of the contract are under negotiation. This site is a replacement for the site that currently exists at the New Vernon firehouse. The Committee noted that a site in the center of Harding is especially needed for 911 services in that area.

The Committee made an appointment to the Planning Board and several appointments to the Hunting Policy Committee.

Administrator McKane will be retiring at the end of March, and eventually moving to South Dakota. Her replacement is currently being sought, with a part-time interim Administrator to be hired until a

replacement is found. A reception for Ms. McKane will be held on March 30. The Township Committee expressed its sincere regrets in her departing Harding.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

Meeting Highlights: Monday March 13, 2017

Board Budget: Superintendent Matt Spelker presented details of the 2017-2018 Harding Township school operating budget. This budget presentation follows the initial discussion of the budget at the January 9th Board meeting, as reported in the February 2017 Thumbnail. The Board Finance committee (Abi Singh and Richard Bruno) and the Board approved this budget after its presentation. The budget will now be submitted to the Executive County Superintendent (ECS) for its approval. As the Superintendent reported in January, the three guidelines for the budget are

- " With the exception of union contractual obligations, the budget process is zero-based, line-by-line
- Current 2016-2017 spending patterns are analyzed for trends
- Budget projections are made for up to 18 months in the future

The Superintendent said that the 2017-2018 school budget meets these guidelines, maintains staffing configurations and all co-curricular activities (clubs, athletics, etc.), provides for professional development and curriculum writing, includes capital projects such as the HVAC system in the gymnasium and elementary school, and continues the integration of technology at all grade levels.

The Superintendent's slide presentation is posted on the District website (<u>www.hardingtwp.org</u>) and contains budgetary details.

Total school budget 2017-2018: \$11,532,481 = Increase of \$14,709 (0.13%) from 2016-2017 Total raised from local taxes: \$10,052,092 = Increase of \$146,671 (1.48%) from 2016-2017 (tax levy was 2.9% in 2016-2017)

N.J. State Aid in the 2017-2018 budget is \$238,834, the same as 2016-2017.

The budget includes Madison High School tuition of \$1.6M. Harding enrollment in Madison is 98 students for the 2016-2017 year, and is projected to be about 109 students for the 2017-2018 year. The Madison tuition cost for Harding is a fixed amount and will stay this amount through the 2019-2020 school year.

As reported previously in the Thumbnail, Harding current enrollment K-8 is 317 students, an increase of 11 students over 2015-2016.

The fact that the budget increase of 1.48% comes in lower than the state mandated limit of 2% means that the District will have a "banked capital" amount of \$51,437 available for use until the 2020-2021 school year should it be needed for future operations.

Upon questions from the Board and the public present, the Superintendent assured that the budget was not skimping on any educational needs, and that the future was not being mortgaged.

After approval by the Executive County Superintendent, it is expected that the Board will adopt the budget at the public hearing on April 24.

Superintendent Report. Superintendent Spelker reported that the next District articulation meeting with interim Madison Superintendent Noonan would be March 30.

Curriculum and Instruction. Chairperson John Flynn reported that the summer session of curriculum writing and revision will include both the reading program and the science program in grades K-5. He also reported that discussions are underway with a committee of teachers to evaluate and likely revise the report card for grades K-5. It was stated that parent involvement would be a part of the revision project.

Madison Report. Abi Singh, Harding Board voting representative on the Madison Board of Education, reported that the Madison superintendent search continues with a professional search firm. He also reported that at its last meeting (February 28) the Madison Board adopted its 2016-2017 goals, and is beginning to evaluate possible capital projects following the completion of the major middle school and high school STEM enhancements that will be completed in August.

Board of Education Meeting Highlights: Monday February 27, 2017

Recognizing successes of Harding school students in both athletics and academics dominated the Board meeting.

Athletics. The Board recognized the presence of the 15 middle school Harding girls' basketball team and their two coaches. The girls' team finished in second place in the championship middle school tournament held in Whippany on February 4. The girls reported that the spectator stands were filled with cheering Harding students, parents, and teachers for their victories and successes.

Academics. The Board recognized the presence of the two middle school Harding teams and their science teacher coach who participated in the Future Cities competition ("The Power of Public Space") on January 14 at Rutgers Livingston campus (<u>http://futurecity.org/new-jersey</u>). Each Harding team was composed of 5 girls. One of the Harding teams placed 5th out of 85 participating New Jersey schools, a very fine showing for the District. These students are participants in the Harding school's Jr. Technical Student Association, which meets once per week at 7:30am, prior to formal classes.

Board Business. Upon their second reading, the Board unanimously passed the 45 Board Bylaws, Policies, and Regulations that by state statute require changes, modifications, and/or introduction for 2017. The Board president and chair of the Policy Committee, Davor Gjivoje, had introduced these Bylaws, Policies, and Regulations in an extensive and lengthy first reading in the meeting of February 6.

Superintendent Report. Superintendent Matt Spelker reported on a continuation of his articulation meetings with the Madison interim school superintendent. His most recent meeting was the morning of the Board meeting. Superintendent Spelker reported that the budgets of both districts were discussed and Madison's superintendent does not foresee the need for any cuts to existing programs or curricula due to budget constraints in the 2017-2018 school year. The next articulation meeting will be March 30 and be devoted to issues of school safety.

The next tentative school budget will be presented to the public at the March 13th Board meeting.

Executive Session. The Board entered into executive session to discuss teacher contract negotiations. No action was taken upon re-convening in open session.
