## **RAPTORS TRUST:**

On Tuesday, Dec 8th, The Raptor Trust received a call about a Bald Eagle, apparently stuck in a tree in Pittstown, NJ. The bird was injured and remained in the tree, unwilling or unable to move for three days before The Avian Wildlife Center of Wantage, NJ was able to rescue and transport the bird to The Raptors Trust in Long Hill Township for medical attention.

# The NJ.COM piece below tells the story

"Lily" the eagle, named by Anna Heath, a four year old from the neighborhood where he was found, is currently in critical condition here at The Raptor Trust. ("Lily" turned out to be a male!) His initial surgery to stabilize and pin the leg went well, but we discovered another lead pellet in his side which we believe may have ruptured an air sac inside his chest. He has also tested positive for lead poisoning. He has a long way to go to recover from several extensive injuries. The lead pellets retrieved from his body have been sent to the US Fish and Wildlife Service firearms experts for ballistic analysis to determine the caliber of the weapon used to shoot him. That agency, along with the NJ Division of Fish and Wildlife, are conducting a state and federal criminal investigation. With the Humane Society of the United States, a \$7500 reward is being offered for any information leading to a conviction. # HARDING TREES PROJECT

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The Harding Trees Project is a new initiative with the objective of bringing about a substantial increase in the number of trees in the township. The mission of the project is to protect and foster the rural image of Harding Township through an abundance of trees.

The project is to consist of two phases and is to be financed through donations.

**Phase I** will be to **replace trees** lost due to adverse weather conditions, such as hurricanes, or through infestations by insects or fungi. In this context, special attention will have to be placed on our efforts to control the anticipated problem of the Emerald Ash Bore (EAB), a separate initiative.

Phase II will be to increase the number of trees in the township.

The number of trees lost is estimated at 700, which will have to be confirmed by an audit. They will have to be replaced with mature trees, over a period of 5 years, at a cost of \$100 per tree, or \$70,000. An attempt will be made, with a local nursery, to conclude a long term supply contract covering the project.

The number of trees needed for Phase II (increasing the number of trees in the township), has yet to be determined. It will obviously be influenced by the success of the replacement part of the project. An inexpensive method to deal with the issue might be a collaboration with an organization such as *ARBOR DAY* of Lincoln, NE. ARBOR DAY is a not-for-profit organization dedicated to fostering the growth of trees, making them available and providing information about planting them and caring for them. They ship bare root plants when they are dormant in the spring and fall seasons. The plants are initially planted in a protected area and given about two years to establish themselves before they are transplanted to their final location.

Comments made by Mayor Nicolas Platt on the eve of Deputy Mayor Ward's last Township Committee Meeting:

"This evening we are going to celebrate the Deputy Mayor Ward's last Township Committee Meeting. If you add them all up, since his election in 2006, Ned has attended 108 Township Committee Meetings and if you figure with heavy workloads of the past these meetings used to go until 11:00pm he spent over 500 hours sitting up on the dais and another 500 hours attending the Executive Meetings and countless hours sitting on his various Board assignments. That is equivalent to Mr. Ward spending 83 days sitting up in the dais.

One cannot imagine what an exciting life Ned has led. You need to look no further than his incredible feats as a Navy fighter pilot.

Sometimes, the plane did not work as advertised and in one instance he had to eject from an extremely high altitude and in the other he "dead sticked" to a safe landing where the chances of survival was less than 5%. Ned could do it all.

When I first sat up here with Ned it took me about 2 months to understand what fundamentally mattered to him, then it took we another 2 months to realize either we agreed or we did not agree. There was no in between or meeting each other half way. And equally frustrating to me was there was no politicking or negotiating that would get Ned to vote any other way than he was going to vote in the first place. He would instantly make up his mind and that was that. When we would meet for breakfast and I tried to reason with him he would always say "don't bother" and look down and say your eggs are getting cold. And that was that. We just sat an enjoyed each other's company. Ned was not a politician. He never was and never wanted to be and that is why we are celebrating him tonight.

Ned was instrumental in his help on the Public Safety Committee to help bring about the wonderful community centric police department we now have under the leadership of Chief Giansanti. Ned also provided remarkable insight into how to apply "best practices" to the Construction and Building Department. He was always available and he grasps the issue immediately. But one thing that was certain, Ned never wavered regardless of the possible ramifications.

But Ned is wired with a compass where the magnetic North has always been what was in the best interest of the resident. It was his extraordinary history of growing up in Harding and his core values that has led the continued preservation of this special community. Ned, tonight we honor you as you have honored all of us. Thank you. Well Ned, we are all here tonight to say you are what makes Harding Township special."

The second phase is to increase the number of trees. The program is in its planning stages.

Cell Tower for New Vernon Center: Because the cellular telephone equipment currently housed in the NVVFD attic is obsolete, the cellular carriers need a new location for a bigger antenna. The TC authorized the lease of a plot in the DPW site between the two recycling sheds. Authorization was given for a 140ft tower. The land lease will require a minimum payment to HT of \$30K annually with a 4% annual escalation. In addition, bidders will pay a one-time \$25K fee and additional 30% for each additional carrier that chooses to use the tower.

The project now goes to the Board of Adjustment for its decision. As well it needs approval from NJ State Historical authorities as the area is a listed historical site. However, unless an alternative site can be found, the precedent is that the tower will be built as the carriers are under FCC directive to build out the system to provide service including vital 911 service.

Trash Day Cost Pegged at \$90K. TC member Yates mentioned that the 2015 trash pickup cost \$90K -- \$65K for labor and \$25K for tipping fees (ie dumping of the trash at a site).

This meeting marked the last day of Ned Ward's service to the Committee and Harding Township. Mayor Platt delivered comments that are included in this Thumbnail issue and Mr. Ward made a short speech as well highlighting progress that has been made in the Police Department, Construction Department and Department of Public Works.

## **BOARD OF EDUCATION**

Meeting Highlights: Board of Education Meeting 12-07-2015 This was a short meeting of the School Board, with just a few updates on school matters.

Superintendent Matt Spelker announced that the results of the *Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers* (PARCC) test have been received by the school district. The results will be reported to the faculty on December 14<sup>th</sup> and to parents on December 15<sup>th</sup>, with information on how to read and interpret the results. The results will be reported to the community at the Board of Education meeting on December 21<sup>st</sup>.

The business administrator Robert Brown reported that the official 2015 school enrollment, as reported to the State, is 292 pupils in grades K-8 and 112 pupils in Madison high school. The 2014 enrollment was 290 in K-8 and 119 in Madison.

The School Board approved another out-of-Harding tuition-paying student. The current tuition rate for non-resident K-8 students is \$8,500 for a full year (if a sibling is also enrolled, the tuition rate is \$7,500/year; the rate for a child of a non-resident employee is \$5,100/year). This 2015 school year Harding has five non-resident, tuition paying students in grades K-8 for total revenue of \$38,100. In addition, there are currently 19 resident students enrolled in the Harding pre-school program, at a rate of \$3,750/year.

Board President Davor Gjivoje announced that the academic presentations at the January and February Board meetings would be on GoogleDocs and on Next Generation Science Standards, respectively.

(Note: the purpose of this brief report is to help Harding residents connect with the School by highlighting significant items addressed by the Board and are not "meeting minutes". Minutes are filed by the Board Secretary and placed on the Harding School website for all to view, generally about a month after the meeting date.)
