Discount Well Water Testing: Wednesday March 1 to Wednesday March 22, 2017. Kemmerer Library Harding Township, 19 Blue Mill Road, New Vernon, Throughout the month of March, Great Swamp Watershed Association (GSWA), in partnership with Kemmerer Library Harding Township (KLHT), will offer discount well-water testing for all who rely on wells as their household water supply. Testing kits will be available for pick-up at the KLHT (located at 19 Blue Mill Rd., New Vernon) between March 1 and March 22. The homeowner must

complete all tests on the morning of March 22, and all testing kits must be returned to the Library between 8:00 a.m. and noon the same day. (Certain tests are time sensitive, so please return kits as directed.) The basic testing package, which includes measures of coliform bacteria, nitrates, manganese, iron, arsenic, and lead, will cost \$125. (The standard cost for this package is over \$300.) Additional tests may be purchased for an additional charge. Lead testing for individuals on public water is also available. For details, please contact Kelly Martin at (973) 538-3500. HARDING TOWNSHIP COMMITTEE

Meeting Highlights: First Meeting with New Mayor, Chris Yates

On January 9, 2017, the Harding Township Committee (TC) held its first meeting with new chairperson (aka mayor), Chris Yates. Nic Platt remains on the committee after his re-election in November. Deputy Mayor is Ms DiTosto.

All Committee persons were in attendance. There were no new ordinances introduced.

The main business was the awarding of contracts to various professionals - lawyers, insurance brokers, engineers, planners, etc. Billing under all contracts remained the same except for three: engineer, Gary Hall, increased

\$5/hour to \$195; tax appeal attorney, Fred Semrau, increased \$3/hour to \$143; auditor, Suplee Clooney, increase 2% to \$27,450.

Walking Path To Be Created. The TC formally accepted a grant that will partially fund a walking path in the Bayne Park/Town Hall area. The exact route of the nearly one mile long, gravel covered path is still being determined. The grant was for \$42,500 while the total cost of the project is estimated at about \$50,000.

Erratum: Last month we wrote that a tree ordinance was defeated by a vote of 3 to 2. In fact the ordinance passed by 3 to 2, with a modification proposed by a citizen.

Township Taxes: to Rise Approximately 1.8%. The TC had a work meeting before regular meeting. The preliminary budget, which will be presented at the February regular meeting, was discussed. As it currently stands, the budget calls for a 1.8% tax increase and a sharp increase in capital spending driven by more work on Kirby Hall (front porch, adding shutters), improvements to DPW building, and replacing equipment at our low income housing project, etc.

Remember this is just the municipal budget and related tax impact. Your municipal taxes account for about a quarter of your property tax bill. Three other uses (School, County and Open Space) make up the rest. Open Space tax has not been determined; thought the Open Space Committee has recommended an increase to the maximum of 5 cents from current 4 cents. And we have no word yet on what the Harding School Board or Morris County Freeholders are proposing.

Meeting Highlights: February 15, 2017

On February 15, your Civic Association once again hosted this event -- an informal engagement of citizens and elected leaders. For those who could not attend, here are prepared comments from the Mayor and TC members."

Nicolas Platt: On Commuter Parking - Now and the Future

Access to mass transit is a major driver of real estate values and Harding is no exception. The economic value of our proximity to Midtown Direct train service to Manhattan cannot be overstated. Towns with their own train stations, like Madison, Chatham, Summit and Short Hills, have seen strong home sales even in down markets.

Harding's ability to claim to be part of this mass transit hub became difficult for us ten years ago. That is when the Borough of Madison excluded Harding residents from participating in its Annual Commuter Parking Lottery as a result of the construction of their new Public Safety Building eliminated as many as 70 parking spaces from the commuter parking lot. Efforts to find spaces for Harding commuters in Madison has become nearly impossible

over the years and was completely shut down last week when Madison's Borough Council passed an ordinance to limit parking along their streets.

There is, however, reason for optimism. A change that involves both the bricks and mortar of an immense new infrastructure project and new "disruptive technology" that will change the way we do things. It will happen faster than we may think

First, the infrastructure: The Hudson Tunnel Project (often referred to as the Gateway Project because it includes much more than a tunnel) is projected to cost \$20 billion and will create two new train tunnels under the Hudson River. The trains will arrive and depart under the soon-to-be renovated Foley Post Office, across the street from the current Penn Station. These two new tunnels will be added to the two current century-old ones that were severely damaged by Hurricane Sandy and are still undergoing extensive repairs. The end result will be four tunnels to be shared by New Jersey Transit and Amtrak-- and the ability to add more trains to the schedule and new tracks designed to handle "faster" trains.

Second, the "disruption". Within the next five years there will be a revolution in automobile "driverless car" technology. It is already happening.

We should plan accordingly, because these two developments will combine to place Harding, with its unique proximity, squarely in the mass transportation "sweet spot" for the very first time.

How will it work?

Harding residents will now have easier access to rail service to New York City through driverless cars that do not need to be parked near the Madison or Convent Station train station. In the short term it will be Uber or a similar service. In the near future however, (about the time the tunnels are completed), driverless cars will move to the forefront. They will either be privately owned or available on a subscription basis from any of a number of service providers including the major car manufactures. These vehicles will be able to drop a commuter off at the station and (if you own it) return home for other family members to use, or if you subscribe, drive off to be used by other subscribers and be in constant use throughout a 24 hour period.

You might have missed it but an ad showed during the recent Super Bowl, the Ford Motor Company showed off both their driverless car and their concept on providing a vehicle on demand. Recently, the Town of Summit announced that they were no longer going to build additional underground commuter parking lot (at a cost of \$10 million) but were instead going to supplement the cost of their residents using Uber (\$162,000) to and from the station to free up parking spaces for shoppers in their downtown.

The future is often unimaginable. But these changes in driving options are coming now and, in various forms, are already on our streets. (Uber is currently conducting a test of driverless cars in downtown St. Louis.) The benefit for Harding is that its commuters will soon have greater, easier and faster access to New York City than they have ever had - and we will be freed of needing parking spaces in our neighboring towns. This is just the beginning of what will be in store for Harding in the next couple of years. Being a commuter to New York who utilized mass transit for the last 33 years I can say emphatically, yes, it will be a game changer.

ENVIROMENTAL COMMISSION

Meeting Highlights: February 1, 2017 Environmental Commission Meeting

The January minutes were approved.

The Commission approved a resolution supporting the Harding Land Trust application for Green Acres funding for Primrose Meadow planting of native species, wild flowers etc.

The 2017 goals include the following:

- 1. Education including website update for the Emerald Ash Borer, hazardous waste, and the addition of a new Wildlife section
- 2. Community Outreach and Engagement including upcoming Forest Health Presentation, Roadside Cleanup and Fall Recycling effort

- 3. Easement Stewardship completion of remaining high priority visits
- 4. Living Landscapes efforts to measure and understand Harding flora diversity

Roberta Sheilds emphasized how important it was to know the creatures that do or might use or occupy the space, and how the plantings that we plant or remove might impact those creatures. We want to plant landscapes friendly to wild life.

The Environmental Commission will host Dr. Jay Kelly on March 8th at 7pm. Dr. Kelly will discuss several informative scientific studies of Forest Health

We had further discussion about the April 22, 2017 Roadside Cleanup from 9a.m. to noon starting from Town Hall. We are looking for volunteers.

Canada Geese:

In its efforts to control the resident Canada geese population, the Township is again asking residents to help identify locations where Canada geese might be nesting. Volunteers are ready to assist by treating eggs so that they will not hatch (called addling), using methods approved by the Fish & Wildlife Service.

If you have a body of water on or near your property, or have seen goslings in prior years, it is likely that you will have nests again this year. Harassing birds during the nesting season, or removing eggs from nests is counterproductive, because it will encourage the birds to re-nest out of sight, where eggs can't be found or effectively treated.

Migratory geese will leave the area by the end of March. Resident bird pairs will then be more visible, usually claiming an area and keeping other pairs away. If you think your property is a potential nesting site, if you see obvious pairs, would like to learn more about what to look for or need help in spotting or treating nests, please call or email: r.a.shields@att.net (973) 267-5673. For help and best results, please call sooner rather than later. Addling eggs controls the growth of the geese population. Done properly, it is both, humane and effective!

BOARD OF EDUCATION

Board of Education Meeting - 7:00pm, Monday January 9, 2017

<u>Board Budget.</u> Superintendent Matt Spelker presented the preliminary 2017/2018 Harding Township school operating budget. The Superintendent stated three guidelines for the budget

- 1) With the exception of union contractual obligations, the budget process is zero-based
- 2) Current 2016-2017 spending patterns are analyzed for trends
- 3) Budget projections are made for up to 18 months in the future

Stated as major factors in the budget process that introduce uncertainties in both revenue and expenses, include enrollment (a net increase of 11 students occurred in enrollment in 2016-2017), health care costs (preliminary health premium increase of 10%-12% estimated), costs for out-of-district placement for special education students (preliminary estimated 4%-6% increase), maintenance needs (HVAC needs for the elementary building delayed from last year due to high bids received), curriculum enhancements, tuition students (current income

from tuition-paying students is about \$80K), and state aid (\$238K in 2016-2017). Another large uncertainty is the faculty union contract, which is under current negotiation.

In response to a question from the Thumbnail reporter, the Superintended and board president, Davor Gjivoje, noted that the Board Facilities and Finance Committee would be discussing the several school finance state aid proposals that have been made by the Governor and legislators. The Board would discuss the implications of these for Harding at a future Board meeting.

The Superintendent summarized the preliminary budget by stating that the 2016-2017 budget might increase by about 2% over the 2016-2017 budget of \$11.4M. For reference, there was a 2.9% increase for the 2016-2017 budget over that for 2015-2016.

Budget schedule: (a) Preliminary budget II on March 13; (b) Tentative budget approved by Board and submitted to County Superintendent in March (date not specified); (c) Public hearing on budget on April 24.

The Superintendent's slide presentation is posted on the school web site: hardingtwp.org Superintendent Report. Superintendent Spelker reported that he continued with his contacts with the Madison school administration, meeting with interim Superintendent Noonan on January 3.

Harding students placed 5th out of 85 NJ schools participating in the Future Cities competition ("The Power of Public Space") on January 14 at the Livingston campus of Rutgers University (http://futurecity.org/new-jersey). The 8 participating students will present their work at the February 27 Board meeting.

Superintendent Spelker announced that the annual Harding science fair would be held on February 7. The school play will be held on March 18-19.

Facilities and Finance. The Board approved a contract for nursing services for a special education out of district placement with Bayada Home Health Care for \$300/day for a six-hour day through June 30, 2017, with a termination clause of thirty days notice.

<u>Madison Report.</u> Abi Singh, Board representative to the Madison Board of Education, reported that the Madison superintendent search was on-going. He also reported that the Madison STEM enhancements were on track for completion in August. There are upgrades for the Madison junior school and a new STEM addition for the high school. The funding comes from the sale of the Madison Board property on Green Village Road.

<u>Executive Session.</u> The Board entered into executive session to discuss the status of negotiations with the Harding Township Education Association union. No actions were to be taken.

Board of Education Meeting Highlights: February 6, 2017

<u>Board Business.</u> Board president and chair of the Policy Committee Davor Gjivoje guided the Board and the public in attendance in an extensive and lengthy first reading of 45 Board Bylaws, Policies, and Regulations that require changes, modifications, and/or introduction for 2017. A large majority of these are required by state legislative mandates. Others are Board responsibilities in the context of effective school oversight and administration. More than 15 mandated policies are in categories related to health, affirmative action, and student assessment. A new mandated policy controls the use of drones over public school property. Another mandated policy relates to professional development for teachers and school leaders, aligning the development to mandated professional standards. A Bylaw on recording of Board meetings was revised. The Board also proposes to slightly change its policy on public participation at meetings by giving the presiding officer (usually the president) the option at the president's discretion to extend an individual public comment beyond the current 5-minute limit. This policy change will provide for the Board to engage in even more constructive discussion with the public.

The Bylaws, Policies, and Regulations are posted on the Board website: hardingtwp.org. The second reading and passage will occur at the February 27th meeting.

The Board also heard and engaged in a lengthy discussion of school board ethics, led by the Board's legal counsel Marc Zitomer. The New Jersey Code requires a Board to annually discuss school ethics, but does not specify how such discussion should occur. The Harding Board opts for transparency purposes to have such a yearly discussion in public and in depth. Mr. Zitomer led the discussion of both sections of the School Ethics Act: Section 1 - Conflicts of Interest, and Section 2 - Code of Ethics (which relates to Board conduct and leadership of the school). Copies of Mr. Zitomer's slides are available from the Board office.

<u>Superintendent Report.</u> Superintendent Matt Spelker reported that he continued with his articulation sessions with the Madison school administration, meeting again with interim Madison Superintendent Noonan on January 31st. Among other items discussed, was the synchronization of the calendars of the two schools. Superintendent Spelker also reported that the Madison High School Principal and the Junior High School Principal met on January 20 in Harding with Harding school Principal Mary Donohue.

Superintendent Spelker proudly announced that the Harding girls' basketball team had finished in second place in the championship tournament held in Whippany on February 4^{th} . He reported that the stands were filled with cheering Harding students, parents, and teachers.

The school play will be held on March 17-19 in the Sellitto gymnasium.

The next tentative school budget will be presented to the public at the March 13th Board meeting.

<u>Curriculum and Instruction.</u> Committee member Richard Bruno reported that work was in progress for the roll out in September of the elementary school NextGen science standards. http://www.nextgenscience.org/new-jersey and accompanying links. These standards are hands-on and laboratory-based. Currently, the Harding elementary school devotes three 40-minute periods a week to science instruction.

<u>Facilities and Finance.</u> The Board unanimously approved the January 2017 bill list in the amount of \$946,774.13.

<u>Science Fair.</u> The Harding Science Fair was held the evening following the Board meeting, February 7. Some 130 students K-8 were involved, more than one third of the student body. The students participated individually or as two-person teams. All of the student participants appeared to be enthusiastic about their intellectual and hands-on opportunities to develop hypotheses, experimental procedures, and understanding of the world of biology, physical sciences, and engineering. Non-Harding science teachers and researchers judged the projects of participants in grades 5-6 and 7-8.
