MORRIS COUNTY 2018 BUDGET REVEALED - SLIGHT INCREASE IN PROPERTY TAXES

Morris County (MC) is a \$306 million operation. County taxes account for about a quarter of your property tax bill.

Yet many/most folks are not clear about what counties in NJ do and who these "freeholders" are. "Why don't we just eliminate that layer?" is a comment heard from time to time.

Freeholders are the elected officials who oversee county government. Aside: Only in NJ are these county officials called "freeholders" -- technically the Board of Chosen Freeholders. The original 1776 NJ constitution said that only those who own (aka hold) property debt free could vote. So the county government was chosen by and from those freeholders. It's an anachronism, but one that, perhaps surprisingly, survives.

- What does a quarter of your taxes and taxes from the other 39 other MC towns help buy for \$306mm? Here 's a high level breakdown:
- \$56.5mm Public Safety (Sheriff, Prosecutor, Jail and Youth Center)
- \$50.5mm Insurance (liability, workers comp, health)
- \$41.4mm Debt Service (Morris County is AAA rated)
- \$32.6mm Health and Human Services
- \$23.6mm Education County college (\$11.8mm) and technical school (\$6.2mm)
- \$23.5mm Statutory Expenses (various items)
- \$22.1mm "General Government" (???)
- \$20.2mm Public Works (road maintenance)
- \$13.7mm Parks & Rec (not the sitcom)
- \$ 8.9mm "Public and Private Programs offset by revenues (???)

- \$ 5.7mm Utilities
- \$ 3.5mm Other Common Operating Functions
- \$ 3.6mm Capital
- \$ 1.1mm Code Enforcement

As in most government entities, the vast bulk of the expenditures (75% is a rough rule of thumb) are for compensation - salaries, benefits and post retirement benefits. The 2018 budget includes 2% aggregate salary adjustment.

Revenue is generated mostly from property taxes (77.6%) but also a many other sources:

- \$237.3mm Taxes
- \$25.4mm Surplus from prior year
- \$19.8mm Local revenues
- \$12.6mm State Aid
- \$4.6mm "Other"
- \$5.6mm "Special Items"

The tax levy increase is 1.79% budget, less than the 2% cap from Trenton. Because the stock of taxable properties (the "ratable base") increase from \$93.5 billion to \$94.4 billion, the tax rate need to raise the revenue increased only slightly. So the tax on the AVERAGE Morris County property (\$41.K) will increase just \$1.67.

The budget presentation highlighted:

- A plan to self-insure employee and retiree prescription drug benefit. So in 2018, funds will be set aside to fund the insurance reserve, for \$3.9mm of "run off expenses". This is expected to save money long-term.
- Leasing of Morris View nursing home. This will "conservatively" reduce the 2018 budget by \$31.1mm and taxes by \$3.2mm. Future savings will be greater still.
- Ballistics Laboratory within Sherriff's office
- Creating Forensic Drug Laboratory.
- Absorbing all cost increases associated with providing emergency dispatch for 23 county municipalities and adding dispatch services for Parsippany Fire and EMS.

Only a handful of citizens attended this meeting.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

Highlights - Board of Education Meeting - 7:00 pm, Monday, February 26, 2018,

The main focus of this evening's meeting was the visit by Mr. Mark Schwarz, Superintendent of the Madison School District. Naturally his remarks centered on Madison High School, the recipients of our Harding graduates.

First he talked about initiatives to enhance the competitiveness of Madison High for students applying to upper level colleges, as well as for graduates going directly into business or industry. He has fostered relationships with Drew University and local businesses to that end. Further, not only does Madison offer diverse course offerings, but additional learning opportunities are available through the use of the "virtual classroom" with online courses.

He then discussed the transition of our students to Madison High School which has been a focus of our Board for some time. It is now felt that students from Harding are both academically and socially fully integrated into student life - indistinguishable from those coming from the Madison schools.

After these very informative remarks, Mr. Schwarz answered questions by our Board and the public which centered on safety of the students in light of the recent school shootings. This gave him the opportunity to address this situation in Madison, bringing the following to light:

- The Madison Police Department supports armed School Resource Officers. We have one such officer at the High School to provide assistance and guidance for situations as they arise.
- Students know who among them might pose a risk those who feel excluded are most likely to pose a threat to themselves and others so inclusivity is key.

The task to provide a safe school has two aspects:

- Provide a culture of cohesiveness among students and trust/confidence in their teachers so that someone acting strangely can be brought forward.
- Teachers and staff proactive in reacting to someone identified as "needing help" so that an adverse situation can be prevented.

After thanking Mr. Schwarz for his comments, the Board continued the meeting as scheduled.

The Superintendent reported that:

Our middle school students continue to practice for our play *Bye- Bye Birdie-* Performance dates are March 16th, 17th, and 18th

Our HTS Science Fair was a huge success with a record number of participants. Thank you to Dr. Gervis, Mrs. Caproni, and Ms. Hartline. Over 150 students participated in the Science Fair this year (more than half the student body).

Our Future Cities Competition competed in Washington, DC over the President's Day weekend and won recognition for the Most Sustainable Food Source. We will be honoring the Future Cities

Team and Dr. Gervis at our March 19th BOE meeting.

The first meeting of the Strategic Planning Committee was extremely successful with 34 participants working together to plan for HTS' future. It was very gratifying to gain the insight and support of the Town Council members, students, parents, and the public at large who were in attendance. The next meeting is scheduled for Monday March 5th at 7 pm.

The PTO Father/Daughter Dance had a fantastic turnout with over 170 students and dads in attendance. Thank you to Cathleen Lazor and her team.

The Tentative Budget will be presented by the Superintendent at the 3/19/18 BOE meeting.

The Business Administrator discussed the revised Board meeting schedule, adjusted so that our Board members could attend the Madison District's board meeting. The revised schedule is posted on the website.

The calendar for the upcoming school year was voted upon and approved. It will also be posted on the website.

Concluding comments by the Board President emphasized that school personnel must take action when words like "kill", "drugs", "weapon" and such are overheard.

The Board then adjourned to executive session to further discuss school safety.

(Note: the purpose of this brief report is to help Harding residents connect with the School by highlighting significant items addressed by the Board and are not "meeting minutes". Those are filed by the Board Secretary and placed on the Harding School website for all to view, generally about a month after the meeting date.)

TOWNSHIP COMMITTEE

At its meeting on March 12, the Township Committee appointed Erik Heller as the Township's new Chief of Police. In addition, the Committee promoted two patrolmen, Stephen DeVries and Michael Gromek, to the rank of Sergeant.

The Committee postponed the adoption of the municipal budget and capital budget because the State has not certified its Municipal State Aid. Therefore those discussion were adjourned to a meeting to be held on April 9.

During the public comment, various members of the public expressed their frustration at the delays in restoring power after this month's winter storms. The Township Committee praised DPW, HTPD and Administrator Bob Falzarano for their dedicated tireless services during the storm. The NJ Board of Public Utilities has announced that it will conduct an inquiry into the response of the various utilities to the storm and the Committee indicated that it would be providing its report for this inquiry. The Township Committee also indicated that it would also reflect upon lessons learned and areas of possible improvement for future weather events.

Finally, the Committee authorized the issuance of \$1.3 million of Bond Anticipation Notes, a short term financing vehicle to purchase Open Space adjacent to Margetts Field, pursuant to requirements of the potential Glen Alpin Diversion.

With 2 major winter storms over a 7-day period the New Vernon Fire Department responded to 49 calls for aid. The First Aid Squad responded to 7 calls during the same period. Although a majority of calls were due to down wires and power outages we did have 2 serious CO emergencies and a rescue that needed to be performed by snowmobile as a result of down trees and live wires blocking a dead-end street. We thank Harding Township Police and DPW for providing invaluable assistance during these emergencies.

Please remember that any downed or broken wire should be treated as a live wire, barricades are road closures are set up for your protection, please follow detours and closures.

We are an all-volunteer organization, completely dependent on donations and fund raisers. Unlike many Fire and First Aid organizations, we receive no funding from the municipal tax base and we

never charge for our services. All donations are greatly appreciated and put to use providing emergency care for the people of New Vernon -- those who live here, those who work here and those passing through.

What's in your water? GSWA is here to help you find out with our popular private water testing program. Pick up a water sampling kit at the Kemmerer Library between March 19-April 9 (a \$10 deposit is required at that time.) Drop off your water sample at the same location on April 10, between 8:00 a.m. - 12:00 p.m. Participants MUST be able to adhere to this drop-off date and timeframe. The basic package measures several water quality parameters including total coliform + E.coli, nitrates, manganese, iron, arsenic, and lead. The discounted rate is \$125 (this would normally cost over \$300). Test add-ons are offered for an additional charge.
