FIRST AID SQUAD

EMERGENCY AT THE NEW VERNON FIRST AID SQUAD

Volunteers are needed now!

Our First Aid Squad, the volunteers who help us when we have a medical emergency, has its own emergency - they need volunteers! Since 1974 the Emergency Medical Technicians (EMT's) of the First Aid Squad have been providing pre-hospital care. The Squad, like the Fire Department, is staffed 100% by volunteers who give their time for this life-saving service. The Squad does not charge for service nor does it receive tax support. But it does have a need for volunteers - most urgently as a full EMT.

The goal is to build the EMT team to at least 28 from its current 24. Before you say "this is not for me," here are the facts:

What does an EMT do? EMTs respond to medical emergencies, traffic accidents and fires. If necessary, they transport the patient to a nearby hospital.

Who can be an EMT? EMTs must live or work in Harding or an adjacent town, be at least 16 years old, be reliable, in good health and pass a background check.

What are the duty requirements? One 12-hour shift per week and one 12-hour weekend night shift per month. Day shifts on weekends are "scrambles" when any available member responds. It's easy to get another member of the Squad to cover for you during vacations or when you are unavailable.

Must I sleep at the Squad HQ? No, Squad members are notified by a pager system. You just need to stay in town during your shifts.

About how often would I get a call? The Squad averages about one call per day. However, there can be days with no calls and days with several calls.

Do I need medical experience? No, once you join the squad you will receive free training that is certified and sponsored by the State at a place and time convenient to you. Continued training is at the Firehouse, at training centers and online. During training, you will ride with an experienced crew to see how the Squad works in action.

Without these volunteers, our First Aid Squad could not exist. Members enjoy the comradery of a supportive team and get the deep satisfaction of knowing they are providing a vital service to the entire township. TOWNSHIP COMMITTEE

Official Actions Taken by the Township Committee:

The Township Committee adopted Harding's 2018 \$9 million Operating Budget, as well as its \$750 thousand Capital Budget. Please refer to March Thumbnail for a detailed discussion of the contents of these budgets.

The Township Committee approved the issuance of \$1.3 million of short term municipal bonds to fund the purchase approximately 5 acres of land at 140 Blue Mill Road, adjacent to Margetts Field. Mr. Platt moved to increase the Open Space tax 1 cent per \$100 of assessed value, from the current 4 cent level. The motion failed to receive a second. Mayor Yates explained that additional revenue was not needed at this time due to the strong position of the Open Space fund, plus the anticipated receipts of this year's assessment was adequate to cover the anticipated expenditures

during 2018.

The Township Committee approved additional spending of \$18 thousand to increase the width of the Municipal Trails from four feet to six feet, and instructed the municipal staff to continue to work with county officials to recover as much of this expense as possible.

Discussion Items:

The Township Committee recognized Nik Bjorkedal and Gerry Scully from the Harding Township Land Trust who discussed the group's desire to begin a Gatehouse renovation project. The Gatehouse is a 13.7 acre property on James Street that is jointly owned by the Town (70%) and by the Land Trust (30%). The Land Trust will commission the crafting of plans which will rehabilitate a century-old shed and help alleviate some of the \$2-3 thousand annual maintenance expense of the property.

Mayor Yates instructed Township Administrator Bob Falzarano to study the actions taken by other municipal governments in response to Governor Murphy's proposed legalization of marijuana. Other Business:

The Township Committee promoted Lisa A. Sharp to the position of Municipal Clerk. The Township Committee recognized Patrolman Louis Pirrello, Jr. for being selected NJ Law Enforcement Against Drugs (L.E.A.D.) Instructor of the Year for 2018.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

Board of Education Meeting 04-16-2018

Highlights - Harding Board of Education Meeting - 7:00pm, Monday April 16, 2018

Presentation: Update on Harding District and Superintendent Goals. The second Update in the school year for the Board on these topics was presented by Superintendent Matt Spelker. The Board requested three updates during the course of the school year in order to ensure that the Goals were being addressed and achieved. The District Goals for the 2017-2018 school year were established by the Board at its June 2017 retreat and are listed on the Board website (hardingtwp.org/page/971). Goal #2 addresses an especially important objective of the Board: to begin the process of creating a five-year strategic plan for the school district 2019-2024. The first meeting of the strategy planning group composed of the school's stakeholders (Board members, parents, students, teachers, and community participants including Harding elected officials, the Harding Chief of Police, and the New Vernon and Green Village fire chiefs) was held on 12 February and has made good progress. The "State of the District" PowerPoint presentation and Notes from the February meeting are contained on the school's home webpage (hardingtwp.org) and make for interesting reading and knowledge. Subsequent meetings will be held on 17 April and

22 May, with creation of the final document ready by 1 January 2019. In terms of all the Goals,

the Superintendent reported good progress on all to date. The Board expressed satisfaction with the status on the Goals to this point in the school year, and especially with the status of the strategic plan. Ultimately the Executive County Superintendent of Schools (residing in Morristown and overseeing Morris and Somerset counties) will determine, with input from the Harding Board, whether the Superintendent's Goals have been met for the school year.

<u>Presentation: Chief School Administrator Evaluation Training.</u> The New Jersey School Board Association for Morris and Essex Counties, Charlene Peterson, outlined for the Board the revised Guide for the evaluation of the chief school administrator (the superintendent in the case of the Harding district). The overall flowchart of the evaluation process contains a new element, a Superintendent Evaluation Pre-Conference that is intended to enhance the information flow and feedback. Another major change is in the terminology for the performance level rankings, intended to give more precise measures of performance.

<u>Superintendent Report.</u> Mr. Spelker reported that the Public Hearing on the District budget would be at the Board meeting of 7 May. The Executive County Superintendent of Schools has approved the budget going into the public hearing. This budget is contained on the school home webpage.

Superintendent Spelker reported that the most recent monthly articulation meeting between the Harding and Madison districts was held on 22 March, with the next meeting scheduled for 19 April. Harding 8th grade students will visit Madison high school on 12 May.

<u>Facilities and Finance.</u> Committee chair Abi Singh reported that one topic of discussion at the April committee meeting was the matter of a possible electrical generator for the school, both for use for the school and for the school as a possible community center in case of severe power outages (such as experienced this past winter). This is under continuing discussion.

The Board approved an amended contract with Cerebral Palsy of North Jersey-Horizon High School to include extraordinary services at the rate of \$190.00/day for 60 days for a total charge of \$11,400 for the remainder of the 2017-2018 school year.

The Board approved the April bill list of expenses of \$966,055.

<u>Personnel and Management</u>. The Board approved the resignation of the school social worker Cheryl Schnabolk and the retirement of 5th grade teacher Lisbeth DeCotiis, both effective 30 June 2018.

Board of Education Meeting March 19, 2018

Highlights - Board of Education Meeting - 7:00pm, Monday, March 19, 2018, Harding students win honors -The first item on the agenda was truly inspiring as the Board honored the Harding Team of 5 students who WON the State Future City competition and proceeded to the Nationals in Washington DC where they won the award for "Most Sustainable Food Production System". (Future City is a project-based learning program where students in 6th, 7th, and 8th grades imagine, research, design, and build cities of the future. Check them out online by going to Futurecity.org/new-jersey) This group has been working on Future Cities for the last three years. Last year they placed 5th in New Jersey, but this year they won 1st place among 80 other competing schools. Harding's Dr. Michael Gervis was the team's mentor, but he insists the team did all the work from thinking up the approach to constructing and presenting their model city.

Harding School District Proposed 2018/19 Budget

The second major item was the presentation of the tentative 2018/19 budget. It is "tentative" because even after waiting for the state funding figures it must still go to the County Board of Ed for approval. Although the State money is significant and appreciated, about 90% of the school budget comes from Harding taxes.

The budget is basically the same as previous with the increases basically just for wages for union members, health insurance and special education requirements. Noteworthy is the impact of Special Ed. Here the district sometimes has to send special education students outside the district for education and therapy needs. This budget addresses 5 additional special education students entering our district, with a substantial impact on the budget increase. Of the approximately \$350K increase in the tentative budget, about \$280K is for additional special ed. As mitigation, whenever there are a sufficient number of students with similar needs, the administration will attempt to accommodate those students at the Harding school, thereby reducing the cost. While considering the budget, the need to set aside sufficient capital maintenance funds was discussed. With the increased frequency of storm events, thought was given to purchasing emergency power generation - which would also serve as an important community resource allowing the school to provide emergency shelter and food.

In addition to the Tentative 2018-19 Budget as presented, the District website has a very clear presentation of the budget figures (present year 2017-18) showing cost per student, sources and allocation of resources, and interesting statistical information. Worth a look - go to https://www.hardingtwp.org then click on Our District, then Board of Education, then Budget. Other Items:

Board Member Abi Singh officially represents our schools at the Madison School Board meetings, since our graduates go on to Madison High. At their last meeting a group of Madison High School students made a presentation to the Board about their plans for their participation in the nation-wide 17 minute march-out. Mr. Singh reported the students presented an organized and thought-out plan of how they intended to conduct their march-out. Subsequently it was observed to be well carried out.

The Superintendent reported

That the readiness to re-open the schools was in large part due to the commendable tireless active direction provided by Facilities Director Joe Pitcher during the storm event and subsequent cleanup. He also noted how diligently the contract crews worked to remove trees and debris over 15 trees were removed in the process. Subsequently, the Board President commended the Superintendent for His role in coordinating with town officials and support services and in communicating with the parents and staff regarding school opening/closing plans. The President also commended Mr. Pitcher's role as well.

How well the school play went despite the storm-related practice disruptions Although the Graduation Ceremony date has not been set yet, school itself will be extended until Wednesday June 20th or possibly June 21st due to recent closings and the possible closing on Wednesday March 21st.

Madison HS freshmen who were former Harding students met with our 8th graders and parents to discuss their experiences starting out in High School. The event seemed to be very productive and encouraging. The Board President subsequently commented that this was a first-time ever event and was indicative of the progress made to further improve and support the smooth transition for

the students from HTS to Madison. He anticipated that it will be repeated in the coming years. (Note: the purpose of this brief report is to help Harding residents connect with the School by highlighting significant items addressed by the Board and are not "meeting minutes". Those are filed by the Board Secretary and placed on the Harding School website for all to view, generally about a month after the meeting date. PLANNING BOARD

Planning Board Meeting March 26, 2018

Roll Call: Mr. dePoortere absent.

Minutes: The minutes of the meeting on February 26, 2018 were approved with a minor correction.

Administrative Reports

Mr. Saulnier raised the issue, in the absence of the Board's attorney, of what happens when a professional is out of commission for a period of time. He also reported that he had interviewed a candidate for the planner position, but added that the Board would actually be engaging the candidate's firm which would provide back-up. He said that he would do some reference checking. With respect to the to the master plan amendment process, he suggested giving the new planner the task of reviewing tables, numbers and language for the open space section.

Mr. Saulnier then began a discussion of various ordinance review topics. First up was the definition of a story in a dwelling. A long standing error in the definition of a half story needs to be cleaned up and made more consistent with surrounding towns. There should also be more clarity about roof measurements from exterior walls. Mr. Fox will propose changes and review with Mr. Hall and the planner prior to submission to the Township Committee. Potential relaxation of setback requirements will be worked in committee. Discussion of relief for lot coverage for barns that add rural character could also be worked in committee regarding the technical aspects or at the board level for a policy-first discussion.

Mr. Saulnier then confirmed with the Board members that their subcommittee assignments were acceptable.

Mr. Clew reported that the Water and Environmental Committee was looking at the latest in septic technology.

Mr. Schliefer reported that Post House Road development discussion at the Board of Adjustment was carried until April.

Mr. Clew reported that the Environmental Commission had conducted a successful presentation on bats. He also mentioned the annual roadside clean up on April 21st and the tree give away cosponsored with the Harding Land Trust at the same time.

It was reported that Historic Preservation Committee did not impose a nine-month wait on demolition for the Traphagen House on Van Beuren.

Mr. Modi reported that the town path project was not wide enough, and that there were staffing changes at the Police Department.

Other Business

There was further discussion on the rural character barn issue. Where did the ordinance come from? Mr. Schliefer said there was concern that a barn that is built now could be leveraged to get lot coverage relief. Minutes of the Planning Board for 2013 need to be looked at to determine the rationale for the ordinance, then discuss further at the next meeting with the three professionals. There was also further discussion about setbacks, but it was agreed that the professionals were required to come to any conclusions.

Ms. Taglairino reminded members that financial disclosures were due by April 1st. Meeting adjourned.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT

Food allergies on the rise

Do you know about 15 million Americans have food allergies including about 6 million under the age of 18? May is Food Allergy Action Month. The prevalence of peanut or tree nut allergy has more than tripled in U.S. children between 1997 and 2008. More than 170 foods have been reported to cause allergic reactions including the eight major food allergens: milk, egg, peanut, tree nuts, wheat, soy, fish, and crustacean shellfish. Food allergy reactions are serious and can be life-threatening. Every three minutes, a food allergy reaction sends someone to the hospital. There is no cure for food allergy. Food allergies are managed by avoiding the problem and learning to recognize and treat reaction symptoms. Anaphylaxis is a severe and potentially life-threatening allergic reaction. Epinephrine is the only medication that can reverse the symptoms of

anaphylaxis. Individuals with food allergies should always have epinephrine auto-injectors on hand.

Symptoms of a severe allergy reaction include shortness of breath, wheezing, pale, faint, trouble breathing, significant swelling of the tongue or lips, repetitive vomiting, and feeling something bad is about to happen.

It is important to know the signs and symptoms of someone who is having an allergic reaction because serious allergic reactions require immediate attention. For more information visit, https://www.foodallergy.org/

GEESE VOLUNTEER PROGRAM

Can you spare <u>just one half hour (30 minutes)</u>, at the most, maybe far less than that? Join a fantastic group of volunteers as they repeat last year's successful efforts to humanely control the Canada Geese population at Bayne Park this summer.

It is SO EASY to Volunteer! Just sign up to be "on call", at 10:00 AM or 2:00 PM or both times, on any day from May 15th thru July 3rd. You will receive a call minutes before your selected

time slot and will be informed if geese are present at the park. If the geese are present, you will come to the park to join 2 or 3 other volunteers to help chase the Geese away. The birds learn very quickly, and after the 1st few weeks, they will rarely return. He covered what the Harding flora consists of, the health of Harding's flora as it relates to the land itself, and the wildlife dependent upon it for sustenance. He will address the public on this issue at a later date. Summary of March 10th Event: As one of the educational events at the Bat Box Building Workshop on March 10th, Kathleen Kerwin of the Rutgers Conservation and Wildlife Management Program gave a presentation on bats, their habitat and their value to the Community especially with respect to the mosquito population.
