SEEKING NOMINATIONS FOR THE HESNA PFEIFFER AWARD FOR CIVIC ENGAGEMENT

For many years the Harding Township Civic Association awarded its Distinguished Citizen Award to an individual or group that demonstrated significant civic engagement and volunteerism. In 2014, the award was given posthumously to Hesna Pfeiffer, a thoroughly engaged citizen of Harding Township, for her 15 plus years of service as the editor of the Thumbnail, the publication of the Civic Association.

TOWNSHIP COMMITTEE

Township Committee Meeting - August 20, 2018

All TC members in attendance.

Police Officer (Class II Special Officer), Matthew Nichy was appointed to the HT Police force.

Bamboo Ordinance Introduced: An ordinance to solve the problem of extremely invasive running bamboo was introduced. Harding is not alone in dealing with this issue according to John Linson, HT arborist. The ordinance targets only running bamboo and is reactive - there is no requirement for authorities to canvas the township. Property owners with offending bamboo have 120 days to comply and submit a correction plan.

Small Cell Equipment, Wireless Cabinets, and Poles Ordinance Passed: The TC passed an ordinance allowing this cell phone equipment to be placed in municipal right of ways.

Marijuana Ordinances Introduced: Two ordinances regarding marijuana were introduced. The first bans businesses from selling marijuana and/or paraphernalia, facilitating the use of marijuana or manufacturing marijuana in Harding. The second prohibits the use or sale of marijuana and/or paraphernalia on public property, parks and/or schools.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

Highlights - Board of Education Meeting - 7:00pm, Monday, September 10, 2018.

Our Harding school staff and the Board of Education Members have been very busy during the summer and reviewed their accomplishments at the meeting tonight.

The Superintendent presented the results of a retreat held early in the summer by the Board where they developed four goals they wanted to achieve during school year 2018/19:

<u>Goal #1</u> - Measure the academic progress of our students through the administration of revised district-wide assessments in reading, math, writing, and so on.

Goal #2 - Continue the process of creating a five-year Strategic Plan which will cover the

period 2019 through 2024. This focuses on where the school wants to be in the future, and the next draft of this plan will be presented by the Superintendent in either a December or January meeting. (It received extensive input from the public, parents, and school personnel, last spring.)

Goal #3 - Continue to enhance safety measures for the school community maintaining confidentiality as needed. This is really an action plan to enhance school security in light of all the domestic terrorist attacks we've had in our schools throughout the nation. Quite a lot has been done. They installed digital cameras at strategic locations. They've installed man-trap doors in the Middle School and man-trap doors for the Elementary School will be scheduled for this fall. (A man-trap door is a second set of doors in the entryways, so that a suspected intruder could be caught between the two doors.) The administration and faculty have undergone safety training, with the Principal completing School Safety Specialist Training of 40 hours. The teachers will complete over six hours of safety training by October 15. Moreover, the Harding Township Police Department completed four hours of active shooter drills with the Morris County Sheriff's office on our premises, whereby they became familiar with our school interior and can work out procedures for containing any intruder. More training in this regard is scheduled. Also an enhanced identification system for employees and visitors is presently being implemented. These undertakings should make all of us in the community and our school children, in particular, feel and actually be a lot safer.

<u>Goal #4</u> - This deals with the re-imaginings of our library/media center in order to support STEM, as well as to make the library/media center more "relevant" since it turns out that libraries throughout all the schools are being less utilized, at least not in the traditional sense. Research which used to be done in the libraries is now done online using computers and other media resources. Several staff and Board members have already visited other schools who have completed, or are planning, restructuring their libraries. At present, all of this is at the preliminary "concept" level, but in the forthcoming months, these concepts will be made public and discussed.

Superintendents Report

An energy audit was completed with results to be forthcoming. However, it can be expected that significant energy savings will be identified, such as more energy-efficient lighting and heating and air conditioning controls.

Presently the installation of an emergency generator is being investigated. The current estimated price is \$200K covering both school buildings. The facilities and finance committee is working to get this estimate significantly lower. No decision about this project has been made; it is only in the very early and "exploratory" phase. The Board

talked about this in some detail, especially in regards to other uses for these funds - for instance upgrading the air conditioning. It was pointed out that the last school closure was a result of trees blocking the roadway and not specifically a power outage. However, it was brought up that a power outage would affect the building temperature which could cause pipes to freeze, affect food storage in the cafeteria, and have other adverse effects. At any rate, very preliminary investigation continues, and so will the discussions.

<u>Business Administrator</u> - The BA reported that a REAP - Rural Education Assistance Program Grant had been approved for about \$70K for technology - and this will be applied to the STEM program.

During the reports from other members of the Board, discussion ensued about how our Harding students, as they move through Madison High School, become prepared for making good college choices. Aside from the general counseling, they get on selecting schools, what help do they get in choosing schools considering the many different aspects constituting an appropriate college with appropriate financial arrangements. The President of the Board requested that the Superintendent to look further into this matter in his upcoming dialogue with Madison.

The rest of the agenda was routine, and the Board was able to adjourn about 9 o'clock, and it had no need for an executive session.

Sponsored by the Harding Township Environmental Commission

The Environmental Commission held a public hearing on the Deer Hunting Policy in June and issued recommendations to the Township Committee in August. The EC recommended improvements in hunting maps and notices posted on Town properties and a ban on the use of Drones for hunting purposes. A recommendation to allow hunting on Sundays was also made, but additional permissions will be required from the State of New Jersey before this can be implemented. This change and further consideration of the use of baiting will be reviewed prior to the 2019 hunting season.

The New Jersey Department of Agriculture has identified defoliation caused by the gypsy moth in Harding Township. Gypsy moths feed on and severely defoliate many species of trees in forested areas. Heavy infestations can lead to tree loss. They will be conducting gypsy moth egg mass surveys in the fall to determine the extent of the infestation and make recommendations on treatment.

This system is used to notify you about threats to health and/or safety that may affect your home or workplace. Authorities may use this emergency notification system to send notifications regarding flooding, police activity, utility and municipal road closure events that may require you to take action to protect yourselves, your family or co-workers. Sign up for free at www.alertharding.com. If you had signed up for Rave/Smart 911 or Everbridge alerts in the past your information was forwarded to AlertHarding. However, we do ask that you register again to ensure that your information is up-to-date in the new system.

BOARD OF HEALTH

A New York Times article reported that the best defense against Lyme Disease is the fox. That is because the White-Footed Mouse is the prime reservoir for *Borrelia burgdorferi*, the bacterium that leads to Lyme Disease and is the fox's primary food source.

According the Kevin Esvelt, an evolutionary biologist from MIT, the disease cycle of Lyme goes like this: Ticks become infected when they bite an infected mouse. The tick attaches itself to a deer for its second blood meal. The deer conveniently delivers the tick to our backyard where it bites a person and transmits the disease. You reduce the number of mice, you eliminate an infection source for the ticks. While it is impossible to reduce the number of ticks, it is possible to seriously impact and reduce the mouse population.

There are 4 known predators to the White-Footed Mouse in New Jersey: the owl, the hawk, the fox and the coyote. These animals feed almost exclusively on the mice, especially the White-Footed Mouse. Residents need to be educated about the important role these predators play in a community and come up with ways to protect them. Joseph Cervone, M.D., Chairman of the Harding Township's Board of Health sent a letter on behalf of the entire Committee that considers this a public health crisis and recommends that steps are taken immediately to protect the fox and coyote, which are currently unprotected animals. These are natural predators and do a great job if we leave them alone. That means we do not disturb fox dens and we ban all trapping or killing of fox and coyote in the Township. Anyone who has suffered the life changing and debilitating effects from contracting Lyme Disease will appreciate any measure the Township can take to reduce the number of these infections. This is no longer a warm season risk. It is possible to get a tick bite in the dead of winter. Communities must to everything they can to combat this crippling disease and it starts with protecting the two single best known predators for hunting down and eliminating the source of this disease: the fox and covote.
