BOARD OF EDUCATION

Highlights - Harding Township Board of Education Meeting - 7:00pm, Monday November 5, 2018

Presentation: Advances in STEM Education. Harding School Principal and Director of Curriculum Mary Donohue presented some national statistics on STEM education and employment, and an update on the on-going important initiative for substantially enhancing the STEM educational opportunities in the Harding K-8 school. The Harding initiative has been underway for some time, including meetings of members of the Board with STEM leaders in the Madison district and visits to the Madison STEM facilities (in both the Madison junior school and the high school). An overall Harding approach is to enhance and enrich the subject areas of math and science by incorporating technology and engineering. The STEM curriculum will be driven by problem-solving, discovery, and exploratory learning. Plans are to have a Harding STEM faculty person in place by the Fall semester of 2019. Planning is also underway for assessing and reconfiguring appropriate space(s) in the existing Middle School building. Costs are a concern of the administration and the Board, and are being factored into the longer range planning. Considerable supportive discussion ensued among Ms. Donohue, the Board, and members of the public in attendance at the meeting.

Superintendent Report. Superintendent Matt Spelker reported that the October Harding-Madison articulation meeting between the Harding and Madison school

superintendents included curriculum matters, STEM facilities in Madison, and a special education tuition agreement with Madison for Harding pre-K to 8 students.

Superintendent Spelker reported that the Harding girl's field hockey team played in the Morris County Field Hockey finals, and lost to the Peck School team. Congratulations to the Harding girls! The Superintendent congratulated Coach John Keating for his last year of field hockey coaching in Harding. Mr. Keating is retiring after 38 years of coaching athletics in Harding.

The 5-year Strategic Plan for the Harding school will be presented and discussed at the December and January meetings of the Board. The public is encouraged to attend.

Facilities and Finance. The Board approved a revised contract for a special education student with the Academy 360-Lower School. This revision involves the addition of a one-on-one aide at a cost of \$145/day for 167 days, with a total cost of \$24,215.

The Board approved an Addendum for special education with the organization The Uncommon Thread. This Addendum adds a para-professional in the school at a rate of \$35/hour, 7 hours per day, 5 days/week, for 31 weeks for a total cost of \$37,975.

(Note: the purpose of this brief report is to help Harding residents connect with the School by highlighting significant items addressed by the Board and are not "meeting minutes". Minutes are filed by the Board Secretary and are placed on the Harding School website, generally about a month after the meeting date.)

PLANNING BOARD

Planning Board Notes for October 22, 2018 Meeting

Mayor Yates gave a presentation on the Affordable Housing issue which included a history of fair share housing and how Harding has dealt with the prior rounds of housing demands. The current solution has many parts including new units at the Farm, use of the Hurstmont and Glen Alpin properties, re-zoning the office property across from Wightman's, and use of the office Park at the other end of Route 202. The Township Committee has set the table for further development, but it is up to the current property owners and developers to execute the plan. The Board reviewed and approved revised plans for the Boszhardt property on Great Oaks Road. The plans used the lot averaging approach to produce a more regularly shaped third lot of approximately three acres. Mr. Saulnier reported that he attended an

informative meeting of the Highlands Coalition and suggested that more attention should be paid to what's going on at that organization. The Board approved a "do not exceed" resolution regarding fees paid to Board professionals. The Board considered an amendment to a Township ordinance regarding half stories in Townhouse Zone 1, and concluded it was not inconsistent with the Master Plan. It was reported that the application for a town house development on the corner of Post House Road was still open before the Board of Adjustment, with a decision to be made at the next meeting. Mr. Modi reported that the Township Committee was considering the issue of red fox trapping and its impact on the control of Lyme disease.

ENVIRONMENTAL COMMISION

The November 7, 2018 Meeting of the Environmental Commission addressed the following matters:

- 1. Updates on the data for the healthy living landscape for Community use. We need an expert to tell us with precision what is good and what is bad, what to pull up and what to encourage.
- 2. The information as to the additions and changes to the Master Plan.
- 3. Discussion with respect to the new Affordable Housing Plan and how it impacts different community resources.
- 4. The community is advised to buy Christmas Trees as locally as possible because of concerns, regarding the spotted lantern fly, a new tick, and beech bark disease.
- 5. Reforestation is necessary to replace trees taken down by diseases or cutting to prevent diseased trees from spreading the disease. The various sturdy and healthy types of trees for replacement were addressed to maintain Harding's beautiful landscape.
- 6. What to do about the Rolling Knolls landfill dump. Whether to truck the debris

out or to treat it in place.

7. Prevention of killing foxes as they eat the mice that eat the diseased insects versus the hunters who wish to hunt them.

Hours of Operation:

Wednesdays:

<u>Commingled Recyclables</u>: Consists of all aluminum and tin cans, glass bottles, all plastic bottles and containers with the Recycling symbol, and #1, 2, 4, 5 & 7. Try to crush plastic bottle to conserve space. Please remember no plastic or paper bags. <u>Commingled Mixed Fiber</u>: Recycling: consists of all paper, cardboard, newspaper, office paper, magazines, and books. Please put loose or shredded paper in paper bag. Please flatten all boxes or fill with other paper products.

<u>Other Accepted Items</u>: Batteries; automotive (car) and household (rechargeable accepted); Automotive and light truck tires, (on or off rim), Propane tanks (BBQ size only) and fluorescent bulbs (tube and compact).

<u>E-Waste items accepted</u>: Computers, monitors, laptops and televisions <u>cannot</u> be put into household trash. However, all E-waste items including printers, copiers, fax machines and all computer peripherals can be brought to the Harding DPW recycling center at the regular hours of operation.
