STATE OF NJ REGULATION FORCES SIX NEW ORDINANCES ON HARDING

New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection has come up with new Stormwater Management Regulations. To respond municipalities must pass ordinances, to be enforced by the police, and carrying fines:

1. Pet Waste - \$500 fine
2. Materials other than Stormwater in Storm Sewer - \$100 - \$500
3. Yard Waste - \$500

4. Litter Control - \$100 - \$500
5. Salt and De-Icing Material - \$100-\$500
6. Illicit Connections to Storm Sewer - \$1000

Municipal Budget 2024 Introduced – 4% Tax Increase Proposed

The April Township Committee (TC) meeting saw the introduction of the 2024 budget. It included a greater tax rate increase than property owners have been used to in recent years - 4% versus the sub-2% increases. Please note that this discussion relates only to the approximately 28% of your tax bill (Harding municipal and Harding Open Space) that is in the control of the TC. The rest of your property tax bill goes to the Harding School (about 47%) and Morris County (24%) and County Open Space (1%). The TC has no control there. By state law, municipal budgets must balance. (Unlike the Federal budget.) Therefore, all expenditure must be offset by revenues: taxes, fees or grants.

What drove the spending increase? Employee Compensation (Salaries & Wages, Health Insurance and Pensions), at 60% of the total expenditures, increases 4.5%. The Salaries & Wages (+4.4%) and Pension lines (+about 11%) were the big drivers. Other budget items were well behaved, increasing less than 2.2%, with one notable exception – Debt Service. Explaining this requires a little background narrative. In 2018 and 2019, Harding purchased two properties for Open Space – 140 Blue Mill and 26 Arborview Way. The purchase was financed with a so-called “Bond Anticipation Note” or BAN. This BAN must be refinanced with longer term debt or paid off by 2029. The BAN is now \$1.62 mm. Since Harding has a goal of being debt free by 2028, the BAN will be paid off in four equal payments of about \$405K per year. Accommodating that \$405K in the budget drives a near doubling of the Debt. Service budget line to \$825K from \$416K. This is a relatively large number to absorb in a budget totaling \$11 million in 2024. A good question came from the audience during the meeting – “Why didn’t this BAN

get chipped away earlier?” It was explained that there was an expectation that the development of Hurstmont and/or Glen Alpin would have yielded a onetime revenue item to offset the BAN. But with both those projects dragging, the income item didn’t happen, and it was prudent to start the BAN pay down now. To reduce the impact on the taxpayer, the TC cut the Open Space tax from 4 cents per \$100 of assessed value to 2 cents. If the Open Space tax had stayed at 4 mils, the overall tax rate would have had to increase a whopping 11% to balance the budget. The Open Space tax is cut in half, but the purpose it Open Space related. What’s it mean for your home budget? The approximately 4% increase generates a \$130 increase in property taxes on a \$1,000,000 assessed home. But remember, your full tax bill will include School and County taxes which combined are more than triple the Municipal and Harding Open Space tax. We don’t know yet how much they are increasing.

The budget shows a Surplus balance at end of 2024 surplus of about \$3.5mm – this had decreased steadily from \$4.3mm in 2020. Surplus was used for 10.7% of the 2024 budget, this also less and less over the last few years. The TC highlighted that tax increases have been running well below inflation and that Harding still has the lowest tax rate in Morris County and one the lowest in NJ. The 2024 capital budget is slashed from \$578.6K (budget figure, not sure if that was spent) to \$176K. That \$176K was for Improvements of facilities (\$25K), Roads (\$55.3K) and Police (\$55.3K - \$22.5K rifles, \$22K ballistic shields, etc.)

“BACK TO NATURE” LANDSCAPE FIRM DONATES 15 TREES FOR HARDING PUBLIC SPACE

In 2014, the Township Committee decided to undertake a major renovation (ultimately \$650,000) of the Kirby Hall which included interior work as well as planting maple trees leading to campus library. All this was done using funds from generous donors. In 2018, Harding received a grant from the Morris County Open Space Committee to create the walking trail. This $\frac{3}{4}$ mile trail has been very popular.

The last thing on the agenda was to produce a landscape design for the 6 acres behind the tennis courts where the longest length of path that was taken over by invasive

plants. The first order of business was to plant trees that were drought resistant and could provide much needed shade in the spring and summer.

This past Christmas, Nicolas Platt, township committeeman met with Anthony Sblendorio, owner of Back to Nature, an award-winning landscape architecture, construction and maintenance firm, to discuss the project. Mr. Sblendorio's plan required 15 Willow Oaks. The Shade Tree Commission oversaw the location of the trees (13 on the municipal campus) while the Citizen's Park Advisory located the other two at Bayne Park.

The Willow Oak is becoming the most popular tree in most nurseries based on its ability to survive long periods of drought, its high disease resistance and its fast growth. Its deep root system also gives it high survivability against high winds.

A few weeks ago, Mr. Platt received a call from Mr. Sblendorio who generously offered to donate the 15 trees to our township and plant them at the first sign of spring. That wonderful day came last week when a Back to Nature truck and a team of professionals showed up to plant them.

“At Back to Nature, our mission transcends landscaping; we are committed to inspiring and enabling positive environmental change within our community. We’re excited to contribute to Harding Township, which is known for its commitment to environmental stewardship, a quality I have long admired,” said Mr. Sblendorio. He continued, “Success for what we do is an integration of improving the land while creating beautiful landscapes, and this contribution will achieve that.”

The visual impact to the meadow has received high praise to anyone who has seen the new trees. Everyone is encouraged to stop by and take a look.

"This is just the beginning" Platt said. "The ultimate goal is to make these many acres a wonderful place to visit. This spring, bird nesting boxes and more planting's will be added. The goal will be to make it an environmentally sensitive preserve to support wildlife and a place for solitude, in the middle of town.”

As any gardener knows, spring is the busiest time of the year. The New Vernon Garden Club is springing into action to get the several gardens it maintains ready to take off for the growing season. The two that people are most familiar with are the front garden at the Tunis-Ellicks House and the adjacent Sarah Ortman Garden. Both of these gardens are up for major overhaul this year. In the T-E garden, some of the more aggressive plants have overwhelmed the better-behaved ones and there are volunteers that were planted by birds and little critters that don't belong there at all. This all has to be reorganized. The Ortman Garden, next door, had become very overgrown and the pathways difficult to navigate. The town was very helpful in

taking the first step, which was to remove some trees that had become too large for that environment and were shading everything out. Now garden club members can dig in and sort out.

Two (NVGC!) women who were instrumental in the construction and maintenance of the Ortman Garden were Barbara Wilkerson and Laura Ascari. Both were honored, Ascari posthumously, at a recent township committee meeting, where they received the Hesna Pfeiffer Award for Civic Engagement. Jen Ascari received the award for her mother. Also, a yellow magnolia was planted in that garden in memory of Laura. It is a Magnolia x acuminata 'Lois', a beautiful descendant of the native cucumber magnolia.
